president and executive director's report

On behalf of Our Place Peel, we are pleased to present to you Our Place Peel's Annual Report for the 2010-2011 year. The past year was an exciting one that provided us with many new initiatives to support the youth in our community.

We want to first and foremost extend our sincere gratitude to our supporters, staff and volunteers for their relentless efforts through a very challenging environment. It is thanks to their continued commitment and dedication to Our Place Peel that we are able to report on the many achievements we have made in 2010/11.

We are so very proud to tell you of our accomplishments at Our Place Peel, however we are most proud of the success of the young people who come to Our Place Peel for safety, shelter and hope. The youth are courageous, and determined to get their lives stabilized while they are at the shelter.

This past year was an exciting one for Our Place Peel as we completed the expansion of the youth shelter. Through the funding from Service Canada and in partnership with the Region of Peel's Homelessness Partnering Strategy we transformed the shelter and added six additional beds. The new beds are for youth who need to stay longer than the three weeks provided at the shelter. The longer term stay will give them the opportunity to stabilize themselves and help them successfully obtain their goals. The expansion will also free up more shelter beds to meet the emergency accommodation needs and reduce the number of youth that are turned away due to lack of capacity. Currently, our average monthly capacity ranges from 90 to 100% and last year alone we turned away approximately 550 youth because we were full.

We want to thank everyone involved in the renovation: staff, students, volunteers and especially the youth who were living in the shelter while the renovation was completed. They showed amazing patience, as many days and nights were filled with a lot of noise from the construction. Everyone always kept in mind what the outcome was and now the shelter looks amazing and we encourage you to come by for a visit.

With the expansion completed the Board of Directors is now more than ever eager to continue with the strategic plan and to ensure that we expand our services throughout the Region of Peel. We are continually reminded that addressing the root causes of homelessness and designing programs aimed at prevention still remain a priority in our community. This past year we continued to face the challenge that many youth were turned away as our beds were full. As the Region of Peel continues to grow, we often struggle to meet the needs of the youth who desperately need our services.

Keeping our youth in the community where they are close to family, friends, school and other community supports is vital to the future of these youth and a priority for our organization moving forward.

This year has been very successful because of the committed staff and volunteers who work with the agency. We would like to thank the entire staff of Our Place Peel for their dedication and hard work to ensure that the youth are provided with the best possible care and support. We would also like to express our sincere appreciation to the volunteers for their commitment and personal sacrifices in time and energy to support the agency.

We want to thank our Board Members who volunteer and help us every day by providing their guidance, their time and their dedication to Our Place Peel.

Finally we want to give our sincere gratitude to you, our donors, friends and family, who have been so committed to Our Place Peel and to our youth who need it the most. Your support provides food, shelter, clothing and most importantly, love, to the youth who turn to us each day. who we are

Our Place Peel is a registered non-profit agency founded in 1985 with a mandate to develop and operate emergency shelter and residential services for youth within the Region of Peel.

Funding for Our Place Peel has been provided by the Region of Peel, The United Way of Peel Region, The Ministry of Children and Youth Services, The Ontario Trillium Foundation, fundraising and gaming activities, as well as donations and grants from various foundations, service clubs, corporations, schools, church groups and concerned individuals.

treasurer's report

It is my pleasure to report on the financial results of Our Place Peel (OPP) for the fiscal year ended March 31, 2011.

Fiscal year 2011 was a very successful year. It was a year of transition as OPP retrenched from two operating facilities to one. In the last year's Treasurer report I wrote that the Board of Directors had approved the closure of Brampton facility due to lack of sustainable funding. I also telegraphed that OPP was awarded \$500K grant (later increased to \$523K) from the Region of Peel Homelessness Partnering Strategy program to create 6 new transitional beds at OPP Mississauga facility.

One year later, I am pleased to report that both projects were successfully implemented.

The Brampton location closed in June 2010. All residents found or were helped by OPP personnel to find an alternative home. Thanks to the Ontario Ministry of Children and Youth Services, Brampton program did not require OPP subsidy. The fact that OPP did not have to subsidize the Brampton location had immediate positive effects on OPP financial results described later in my report.

In the second half of the year Management, Board's Expansion Committee and the Board were very busy planning, sourcing and overseeing major renovations to the Emergency Youth Shelter in Mississauga. The \$523K grant OPP received from Region of Peel Homelessness Partnering Strategy program upgraded the Mississauga facility and created 6 transitional beds. These six beds replaced the six beds lost as a result of Brampton facility closure. Effectively, OPP maintained the capacity of 20 beds but reduced the cost of operating these 20 beds as the duplicate cost of running 2 physical locations was eliminated.

Despite very tight deadlines imposed by the contract with the Region of Peel, the project was completed on time and on budget. I would like to thank and congratulate the Enhancement project team, management, volunteers and anyone involved for job well done.

With these two major projects on the go and the transition of the Executive Director duties upon her return from maternity leave, we did not fill the fundraising department vacancy.

We are currently considering various alternatives to kickstart OPP fundraising efforts. We will need additional funds to pay for the administrative office as the shelter's basement space was converted into 6 transitional beds for the expansion of OPP.

Financial Review - Operations

Overall, in fiscal 2011 Our Place Peel Revenues were higher than Expenditures by \$117K. Both lower Revenues and Expenditures were lower mainly due to the closure of Brampton residential program.

Grants, donations, fundraising and other revenues for the year was \$988K. This was lower by \$164K than Revenue in the prior year. Adjusted for \$146K in non-recurring Revenues received in 2010 and \$66K in reduced funding in 2011 due to the Brampton closure, OPP Revenue was \$27K higher mainly as a result of OPP being selected by BDO Canada LLP to receive \$46K in proceeds from the bowling tournament. Thank you BDO.

The costs for the year were \$871K, \$280K lower than in the prior year. More than half of this reduction in costs was a direct result of Brampton facility closure and \$42K was non-recurring costs incurred in 2010. Good cost controls by management and personnel vacancies in administration and fundraising departments in 2011 accounted for the balance of reduced costs.

OPP spent more than last year on: repairs and maintenance (the cost of roof repairs which was funded by GE Capital) and professional fees.

Unrestricted Fund

Overall in 2011, the fund increased by \$129K as operations generated \$145K before capital assets amortization offset by \$16K addition to capital assets.

Capital Asset Fund

The balance in the Capital Asset Fund decreased by \$12K or 1.8%. The decrease was the result of \$28K amortization of the existing assets offset by \$16K paid for the purchases of the new or replacement assets.

Capital Reserve Fund

There have been no changes to this Fund. The Fund balance remained \$90K.

Balance Sheet Review

Overall, OPP cash and cash equivalent position in fiscal 2011 increased by \$128K. This was a welcomed outcome after years of cash decreases and the breakeven last year, first sign of turnaround. It also demonstrates the real cost of the past subsidies to support Brampton facility.

The Board of Directors intermediate objective is to increase cash reserves to approximately 4 months of operating expenses in order to have enough time to identify alternative sources of Revenues if such need arises.

The mix of Cash to Cash equivalent will vary from year to year and is based on the immediate cash needs as of the year end date. Cash equivalents consist of safe guaranteed investment certificates with maturity of less than one year and will be renewed for similar term. We currently are reviewing options to invest current excess of cash to earn higher returns but within OPP investment policies and without compromising safety of principal. Working capital was little changed (outflow of \$1K). Both the enhancement project receivable and payable were received and paid subsequent to year end. Reduction in Deferred Revenue was offset by net increase in construction payable. Current assets excluding construction funding receivable, decreased slightly by \$3K.

Current liabilities decreased \$7K due to the timing of the payments.

Decrease in Deferred revenue reflects the drawdowns of the United Way of Peel Region's Strengthening Organizational Effectiveness grant and GE Capital donation for the roof replacement, both completed in 2011.

Capital loan of \$523K represents the amount of grant received from Region of Peel. The loan is forgivable 20% per year conditional on OPP compliance with the conditions of the grant. The Board of Directors has intentions to comply and will oversee that OPP complies with the contract terms.

Closing Remarks

To close, on behalf of Our Place Peel Board of Directors, Management, staff and the youth of the Region of Peel - recipients of our services, I would like to thank once again all of our community-funding sources: The United Way of Peel Region, The Ontario Ministry of Children and Youth Services, The Region of Peel, as well as all corporate and individual sponsors and supporters for their generous contributions. A complete list of the fiscal 2011 contributors is included in Our Place Peel 2010-2011 Annual Report. We hope you continue your generous support.

shelter manager's report

Being the only Emergency Youth Shelter in the Region of Peel, Our Place Peel continues to turn a high number of youth away due to lack of bed availability within the shelter. In the 2010/2011 fiscal year, Our Place Peel has turned away a recorded high of 664 youth. This averages out to 55 youth being turned away each month. When a youth is seeking shelter and there are no beds available at Our Place Peel, the staff often have to resort to referring them to either an adult shelter in the Region and/or to another shelter outside of Peel.

Last year Our Place Peel served a total of 354 youth; of these 241 were unique. The total unique males that were served were 130 and the total unique females were 111. The average age of youth served was 18.8 years old and the average length of stay was 12.48 days.

Our occupancy rate for the 2010/2011 fiscal year was 92.94%.

Many of the youth served at Our Place Peel are being referred to us from various schools, Peel and Non Peel agencies, churches, friends, and hospitals. A large number of the youth who seek shelter at Our Place Peel are those coming from broken homes; either family breakdowns, or conflict with parent(s) or step parent.

We also continue to see many youth who are dealing with drug/alcohol use/abuse, youth in conflict with the law, unemployment, transient youth and an increasing number of youth dealing with Mental Health related issues. In the past few years one of the biggest struggles we have are getting youth connected to the appropriate resources specifically related to Mental Health. By the time our Front Line Staff team is able to make the appropriate referrals; the youth either does not follow through with the appointments or does not remember they had an appointment. If that youth returns to the shelter, we find ourselves back at square one trying to make those connections once again. One of the main reasons for this is because there is generally a long time between the scheduled appointments and the actual appointments.

Having worked for Our Place Peel for over 6 years, I can see the same commitment that our Front Line Staff have to the youth I have. We have a tremendously strong group of individuals who devote themselves to the youth week after week and I would like to thank them for their hard work and dedication to the organization and mostly to the youth. Without them we would not be able to deliver the type of service that we do.

I would like to take this opportunity to send best wish to Jen, our Resource Counsellor and her husband Dave as they are about to embark on a new chapter in their lives with the coming of a new baby boy; we wish you well and look forward to seeing you and the new little one very soon.

resource room report

In July of 2010 I was given the opportunity to return back as the Resource Counsellor full time. I was excited to be back as I feel that being the Resource Counsellor allows me to help the youth achieve their individual goals and case plans in order to be successful. With everything so accessible on the internet including social networking; this allows the youth who are residing in the shelter not only to be more productive but also allows them to stay connected to their family and friends.

Throughout the 2010-2011 fiscal year the Resource Room had 1354 visits; these visits include current residents, ex residents as well as community members. The number of unique clients to use the Resource Room in 2010-2011 was 316; of this 102 of them were new to the shelter and have never used the Resource Room before. Clients utilize the computers in the Resource Room do so for many reasons. For the fiscal year the computer usage totaled 1641 hours. 37% of that time was spent on housing and job searching, 40% was spent on youth surfing the web and 26% was spent on youth completing homework, looking up educational resources, email/chat or Microsoft word.

Weekly workshops were consistently run throughout the year. These workshops include housing workshops, resumes writing/updating, employment searches and accommodation searching. These workshops are generally interactive allowing the clients to ask questions throughout the presentation.

Through my networking at Committee Meetings I was able to coordinate with numerous outside organizations to come to the shelter and do presentations for the youth as well as educating the staff on other programs in and around the Peel Region. Some of the organizations included YMCA Youth Gambling, CERA, and Career Foundations.

While in the Resource Room ex residents are permitted to return to the shelter to use the Resource Room computers; this allows me to follow up with the client to see how they are doing and perhaps support them with other things such as enhancing their interviewing skills or support with budgeting.

I would like to share a story of one particular youth who I have remained in contact with. Lisa is a 16 year old youth who was referred to us from another community agency. Lisa was admitted into the hospital as she attempted suicide and then was released to Our Place Peel. Lisa's history includes extensive abuse (Various types), which lead to her suffering from depression and drug and alcohol use.

Lisa was very withdrawn and uncomfortable in the shelter. She refused to eat or speak with any of the staff. When Lisa did speak with staff she was very depressed and had no plan for her future as she stated that she did not care. Throughout her stay at the Our Place Peel she began to build relationships with the staff and began to open up about the abuse that she endured. Lisa began to eat and laugh, she also created a plan for herself on how to keep safe and what her future looked like. With the supportive staff being available for her 24 hours she has learned to open up and trust others. Lisa has come a long way during her stay at our Place Peel.

For the last year Lisa has been living on her own and has come to the Resource Room on numerous occasions to complete homework and look up resources as she does not have access to a computer. Even though Lisa continues to struggle with the abuse and addiction issues she has connected with many agencies to help her overcome these issues. Lisa will be graduating from high school this year and will be going to a Drug and Alcohol facility for treatment in the summer.

our place peel statistical summary

The 2010-2011 year saw Our Place Peel operate at 92.94% percent occupancy, this stat as well as the number of turn aways (664) underscores the continued need for emergency shelter beds for youth within the Region of Peel. In addition to the number of youth served at Our Place Peel, Cawthra Road Shelter and Wilkinson Road Shelter served a total of approximately 210 youth from the period of April 1 – Dec. 31, 2010. While these shelters offer housing to youth they are vastly different environments then that of Our Place Peel. Being much larger (approximately 80 beds each) and serving people of all ages above 16 years, these places can present further roadblocks for homeless youth. At Our Place Peel there exists an understanding that youth are different from adults. While we do hold our youth accountable and require them to be active in achieving their goals, we recognize that they are still youth and require an environment where they can sometimes act that way and a staff team that can show patience.

One of the statistics Our Place Peel keeps a record of is Primary Reason for Service. This is the key reason why the youth needed shelter on the day they came into the program. While the number 1 reason of parent conflict has remained fairly consistent, one concerning stat is that of transient lifestyle. This speaks to the fact that we are serving youth who are having a difficult time establishing themselves. Many of these youth have stayed more than once at Our Place Peel and other shelters and in spite of our best efforts they continue to require these services. This places the burden upon us to ensure we are doing all we can to teach and mentor these youth, it is not simply enough to assist them with getting social assistance and room to rent, all too often we are seeing youth attain these goals, only to return to the shelter months or even weeks later.

Another statistic Our Place Peel keeps track of is the Recidivism Rate. The vast majority of clients who stayed at Our Place Peel did so only once over the course of the year. What our stats do not show is the progress of residents who have had multiple stays over the year. In many cases the youth we serve come to Our Place Peel with limited social skills and having no history of positive social support or role modeling. It is in these youth that the true impact of Our Place Peel can often be seen. For some, they arrive for their first stay with limited skills, low self esteem and defiant behaviours. However, as some of these youth come into the program time after time, their skills and confidence increase and their behaviour becomes much more positive. This is a direct reflection of the investment of Our Place Peel into these youth. From the basic necessities of life to the role modeling and care of staff, these youth often begin to see that they are not alone and that there is a support for them in Our Place Peel.

There is no one reason behind homelessness, it is a combination of factors that lead to this outcome. As best as we can we try to track these factors within the youth we serve. One factor to highlight within the homeless youth population is that of mental health. Of the 241 unique youth served at Our Place Peel over the year, 54 disclosed that they suffered some form of mental illness. This presented in various ways, from youth who came in with medication and well defined diagnoses, to youth who stated they had been diagnosed years earlier but hadn't dealt with it. In addition, it must be noted that there is a good likelihood that some youth did not divulge any mental health diagnoses to staff.

Even more concerning, is the fact that some youth which may be dealing with mental health issues have simply never been diagnosed. It presents a major hurdle to these youth and to those trying to support them. Given the long wait list times for initial psychiatric assessments it is frustrating exercise. While we may be able to assist the youth in setting up an assessment, it can sometimes be 6+ months before they get an appointment and in that time the youth all too often forgets or gives up wanting the assistance.

When looking at the reasons for discharge stat it is important to note that the percentages for reasons for discharge remain fairly consistent. For instance, the 'Did Not Return to Shelter' number generally hovers around 33%. The fact that these numbers are by and large consistent enables us to have benchmarks by which goals can be set for case management.

our place peel transitional program

Our Place Peel is excited to announce the opening of our 6 bed Transitional Program. The Transitional Program will provide youth with the opportunity to stay in a semi independent setting where they will receive the support and guidance of Our Place Peel staff in developing the tools necessary for living independently.

Youth will be eligible to stay in the Transitional Program for up to 3 months. This program will be of great benefit to those youth who are working or in school full time and are not eligible for government based income support.

a volunteer's tale

My name is Amanda, I have been a volunteer at Our Place Peel for five months and it has been one of the most inspirational accomplishments I have ever done. Being able to help at the shelter is very fulfilling for me. I love to be around the youth in this establishment and feel like I connect with everyone quite well; reason being, I once was a homeless youth as well. Growing up I had no one except for a few friends that could not help me, a backpack full of clothes, and the constant stress about the simplest things in life that others take for granted; not to mention I suffered from extreme low self esteem, and anger controlled the rest of me.

I look at the youth in the shelter and I feel so inspired that they are so strong, but I know how scared they are on the inside. It gives me the great pride and I am incredibly honoured to have just a few hours a week to spend with our children of the future.

Volunteering with Our Place Peel has given me a sense of peace and a clearer understanding of myself; and being able to communicate with others in a healthy way has enhanced my life tremendously. In the past, I felt empty and alone, as if there was a void in my life, like something was missing. Since coming to Our Place Peel the staff and youth have made things in my life full, I finally know where I want to be in life.

My goal at the shelter is not to change everyone, but with the possibility that maybe I can help one youth see, feel, or do something they may have thought to be impossible, and help them make that a reality, that is what I call the gift of life.

youth story

Mya arrived at Our Place Peel in winter 2010. Mya had previously been living with her mother in Mississauga but was forced to move out as she could not afford the rent that her mother was charging her. At this point, Mya moved in with her then-boyfriend. At the time, Mya's boyfriend was verbally abusive toward her but in the weeks leading up to Mya coming to Our Place Peel, he had become physically abusive as well. It was due to this that Mya decided she had had enough and needed to find another place to live and entered a homeless shelter for the first time in her life.

During her stay at Our Place Peel, Mya attended an adult education facility in order to complete her high school credits. During her initial meetings with Our Place Peel staff, Mya divulged that she was planning to finish her credits and hopefully attend York University in the Fall of 2011.

Mya's primary worker worked extensively in helping Mya achieve her goals. She advocated on Mya's behalf with Ontario Works to secure funding for Mya's text books for school as well as funding for Mya to complete a university application form.

With the help of front line staff and the Resource Counselor, Mya conducted an independent housing search. Mya eventually found independent housing in the form of a basement apartment and moved into her new accommodations a few weeks later.

John arrived at Our Place Peel during the early morning hours of June 15. John was brought to Our Place Peel after fleeing his father's home.



John had previously lived in France and the United States but had come to stay with his father and step-mother after graduating high school. Being unfamiliar with the area, John missed a bus and returned home late for curfew on the night. It was at this point that John's father physically assaulted him. John made his way out the situation with the assistance of his stepmother and found his way to Our Place Peel.

Upon arriving at Our Place Peel, John met with a front line staff that assisted him in getting in contact with his aunt overseas. Within hours, John's aunt had secured a plane ticket for John to return to live with her. At 6pm the following evening an Our Place Peel staff member was able to transport John to the airport along with a care package of snacks for the flight.

Although the length of John's stay at Our Place Peel was not long, his story shows the impact Our Place Peel can have on a youth in need.

shelter enhancement project

For several months I would come to the office wearing dress pants and a shirt and go about my day checking and responding to emails, responding to my voice mail messages, checking in with the staff and youth.

It was not too soon after the construction began that I realized that I was leaving the office looking like I had crawled out of a hole of dust. My pants were filthy, my shoes scuffed and my hair raggedy and full of dust. There were many days of stress and frustration and others of excitement and anticipation.

Drilling, hammering, banging, cutting and sanding, things that one could not care too much about, but to others means a temporary home; a place to live, for at least a few months where support and encouragement is at your disposal.

Thanks to the Homeless Partnering Strategy and Service Canada we were able to do this for the many youth that we see each year. The funds provided to us allowed us to “enhance” our existing space within our Emergency Youth Shelter to create an additional 6 beds for those who required more support with case planning.

We were able to upgrade our existing fire alarm system, installation of new duct work for better ventilation, renovated all the washrooms, created a youth lounge for those who are residing in the transitional program which is equipped with four computer stations; we also purchased new bedroom furnishings for all three rooms and new high efficient appliances.

At this time we would like to thank Service Canada and the Homeless Partnering Strategy along with the Region of Peel for making this happen not only for our shelter, but also for our youth.
